EREA School Renewal

Preparations are under way for the Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) School Renewal process that will take place from the 8th to 10th June. Each EREA school throughout Australia undertakes a School Renewal every 5 years. It is an opportunity for the community to reflect on the EREA Charter and how we are being faithful to the Touchstones of: Liberating Education, Inclusive Community, Gospel Spirituality and Justice and Solidarity.

Staff have completed a survey that asks them to name the ways we live the Touchstones at Rostrevor and make suggestions as to how we can enhance our commitment to being an authentic Catholic School in the Edmund Rice Tradition. Focus groups of students and parents have also been involved in this process.

The collated surveys, along with a Principal's reflection and sample school publications will be submitted to an External Validation Team led by the National EREA Director of Identity, Mr Chris Smith. During the three day visit, the Validation Team will interview a wide cross-section of the community including students, teachers, parents, the College Board and Old Scholars.

Once the process has been completed the Validation Team will prepare a Renewal Report that will contain commendations and recommendations that will inform our development of our Strategic Directions and our School Improvement Plan.

It is an exciting time for the College that provides an opportunity to celebrate what we do well, as well as to look to the future and ways we can enhance our school. I look forward to sharing the commendations and recommendations with the community when the Renewal Report is finalized.

We must congratulate our Prefect body who proposed the initiative at the end of last year, assisted with the planning and supported the event on the night. Special thanks must go to **Matthew Del Corso** and **Ross Pezos** (Class of '15), who, together, did such a wonderful job with the Master of Ceremony role.

A big thank you too to staff and students who helped on the night with setting up, as stage hands, with cooking, distributing food and drinks as well as packing up and cleaning up to ensure that our grounds were ready for co-curricular first thing Saturday morning.

Reconciliation Week

Today marks the beginning of National Reconciliation Week, an event which seeks to encourage all Australians to reflect on and celebrate our shared histories, unique cultures and achievements. This week has a particular focus on Indigenous History in Australia and our journey towards reconciliation which forms a significant part of Australia's story, with the theme this year, "Our History, Our Story, Our Future".

Today is the anniversary of the 1967 referendum, a defining event in our nation's history. The referendum saw over 90% of Australians vote to give the Commonwealth the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and to recognise them in our national census.

Next Friday, 3 June we will mark the anniversary of the High Court of Australia's landmark Mabo decision, which legally recognised that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have a special relationship to the land – that existed prior to colonisation and still exists today.

This year is particularly significant, with Reconciliation Australia celebrating a number of anniversaries—including 25 years of formal reconciliation in Australia with the establishment of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation in 1991. It is also 15 years since Reconciliation Australia was formed and 10 years of success in its Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) program.

Reconciliation is a word that is thrown around a lot, used in many ways, and in conjunction with all different kinds of phrases. It is a word that is incredibly important to all Australians but is not truly understood by most of us. To reconcile is to bring into agreement or harmony two opponents. It involves restoring something that was previously lost, and recovering from, and righting, injustices of the past.

Since this Tuesday and continuing next week until Friday, the theme for House gatherings is Reconciliation where nominated students will give a brief presentation on National Reconciliation Week and lead the House gathering in prayer.

This morning several Indigenous Youth Leadership Program (IYLP) students attended a National Reconciliation Week breakfast at the Adelaide Convention Centre.

On Wednesday, 1 June, we have a Boarders' Reconciliation High Tea with two guest speakers namely, Terry Sparrow, Principal Policy Officer – Office of the Commissioner for Aboriginal Engagement and Kelly Harrington, Principal Program Officer – Department of the Premier and Cabinet.

On Friday 3 June, Indigenous singer/songwriter, Scott Darlow, will perform for Years 5-12 students. Scott uses music as a tool to open the hearts and minds of young people with the aim of uniting cultures. Scott will speak to students about

Indigenous culture and will challenge them to help facilitate reconciliation and understanding. At lunch time several activities will take place including a Mabo Football Match and barbecue for students. It is hoped that Scott Darlow will stay on during lunch and continue to play music from the Pavilion.

Many thanks to Tania Garrand, Acting Indigenous Liaison Officer and Anthony Callisto, Acting Coordinator – Service Learning for the planning of the many activities to celebrate this important occasion.

A reminder to Year 12 families that interviews are compulsory – if you are yet to make contact with subject teachers please do so as a matter of priority (via email or telephone).

Examinations

The class of 2015 certainly left a memorable legacy, attaining outstanding results in their final examinations and assessments. Although the SACE Board examinations are still a number of months away (schedule below for your reference), our current Year 12s will have the opportunity to sit mid-year trial exams in Term Three, Week One. These examinations provide superb preparation, emulating the processes and structure of the final examinations. Students will undertake revision in class under the direction of their subject teachers, will attend an Elevate study skills seminar and are also expected to use their Swot Vac time effectively in order to adequately prepare for their trial examinations. Following these examinations, another round of Year 12 parent-student-teacher interviews will be held on Monday 22nd August, allowing teachers to provide updated feedback regarding your son's readiness for the end of year examinations.

Each year I have the privilege and pleasure of attending a conference that is held for Primary School Leaders who lead in schools based on the charism of Edmund Rice. This year, Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) invited all Junior Leaders to spend three days in Perth under the theme, "Walking in the footsteps of Edmund – the path ahead."

We were hosted by the two Edmund Rice Western Australian Colleges; Trinity College and Aquinas College. Part of our time involved us having extensive tours of their grounds and learning areas and we also shared their hospitality on several occasions. Both schools are impressive, if not for their locations (Trinity on the banks of the Swan River and Aquinas on the banks of the Canning River) then because of their uncanny resemblance to Rostrevor. They don't physically 'look' the same as we do, but the charism of Edmund Rice is as alive in WA as it is in SA.

A founding charism is described as being threefold in nature. It involves;

- **A unique faith vision** – for Edmund Rice this was presence
- **A unique form of living;** the call to wholeness that is attractive and dynamic – for Edmund Rice this was compassion
- **A unique response** – for Edmund Rice this was liberation

In articulating identity, EREA calls upon the message of the Gospel, the charism of Edmund Rice, the mission of Catholic Education, the story of the Christian Brothers and the lived reality of schools which have shared a long and proud Christian Brothers heritage. All schools and educational entities in the Edmund Rice tradition across Australia are bound by a Charter which comprises touchstones giving ideals authentically linked with the charism of Blessed Edmund Rice and which underpin the ministry in our schools and educational endeavours;

"The Charter aims to inspire school communities to foster energetically the vision of a charismatic leader, Blessed Edmund Rice, in the Spirit of Christ and the educational mission of the Catholic Church."

As Catholic Schools in the Edmund Rice tradition, we aspire to be faithful to the four Charter touchstones:

Liberating Education

We open hearts and minds, through quality teaching and learning experiences, so that through critical reflection and engagement each person is hope-filled and free to build a better world for all.

Gospel Spirituality

We invite all people into the story of Jesus and strive to make his message of compassion, justice and peace a living reality within our community.

Inclusive Community

Our community is accepting and welcoming, fostering right relationships and committed to the common good.

Justice and Solidarity

We are committed to justice and peace for all, grounded in a spirituality of action and reflection that calls us to stand in solidarity with those who are marginalised and the Earth itself.

These are bold, yet clear directions for all EREA schools and central to our identities – they are the things that bind us together. They also provide us with a 'compass point' and challenge us to live and to act as Edmund did in solidarity with one another.

So, what is the path ahead? Our (Rostrevor's) pathway into the future is to challenge ourselves to be a part of a community that celebrates Liberation, Spirituality, Inclusion and Justice. In a world where the pace of life means we often replace what is 'normal' with the 'new normal', this is not easy – but nothing that ever truly changes the world is!
